

Sport premium budget impact statement 2015-16

Yenton Primary received £9,500 and this is how we spent the money:

Transport costs (£800):- This enabled us to provide mini-bus transport to and from competitions. As a result we entered level 2 competitions and a Netball league, without this transport we would have been unable to attend these.

Equipment costs (£1420):- This enables us to buy in high quality equipment including:-

- Netball posts and nets
- Tennis nets
- Tennis balls
- Multi-purpose sports balls
- Volleyballs
- Tri-golf equipment

As a result of this high quality equipment a greater range of sports could be delivered both during and after school. With the new equipment we were able to have more practises for sports tournaments and learn about new sports such as Tri-Golf, which we then went on to enter at a competitive level. The netball posts and nets enabled us to host netball matches at our school for the first time, which gave the school a sense of team spirit and it encouraged more children to take part.

Wilson Stuart Active Society Membership (£900):- This enabled us access to all of the level 2 competitions that we entered. As a result the school's improvement in level 2 events has improved dramatically. In addition it enabled further CPD support and free bike ability courses for Year 5 children, delivered by Aspire Sports. Wilson Stuart also gave two students the opportunity to take part in a Bronze Ambassador programme which gave them the skills to organise a schools sports crew and implement inter-school competitions, such as handball. They also organised a Staff vs. Student rounder's match which improved social development and improved opportunities for sport.

Lunchtime provision (£2,280):- Enabled us to employ a sports coach (through Aspire Sports) to deliver lunchtime sports specific activities, free play activities and support for wet weather provision. As a result all children in KS2 had the opportunity to take part in extra-curricular sport/games at least three times per week. As well as the sports coach from Aspire Sports, we hired an agency sports coach to raise physical activities at lunch time arranging mini tournaments and games at lunchtime. This improved team spirit,

After school provision (£2850): - Enabled children in KS1/2 to access **free** after school provision up to three times a week for the whole academic year. As a result of this, on average, 75 children accessed the clubs each week.

Aspire Workshops for children (£500): - Due to the sporting calendar for 2015/16 being a jam packed one with the Euros and the Olympics taking place, we thought it would be a great time to raise awareness of the importance of sport and the effects it has on us. We held a 'Road to Rio' workshop for the whole school which enabled children to develop skills of Olympians, including cycling, rowing fencing and archery. It gave them a chance to take part in sports that they might not have experienced before.

By the end of the Academic Year 2015-16 we had spent £8250 of the Sport Premium Fund, bringing forward £750 for the next academic year.
